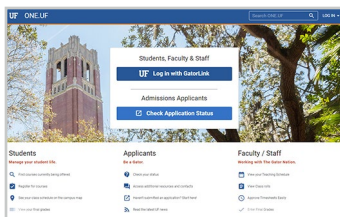

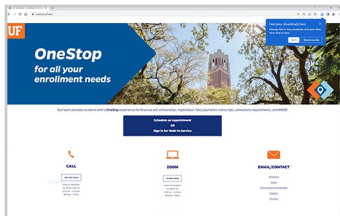
TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS: GRAD GATOR ESSENTIALS

Tools and tips to ease your transition into life at UF



ONE.UF Self-Service

ONE.UF is the online portal where you can register for courses, check class schedules, view grades, submit faculty evaluations, request transcripts, view financial aid payouts, and pay fees and charges. Access it at one.ufl.edu.



OneStop

OneStop provides you with 24-hour access to enrollment services and answers questions about admissions, campus finances, degree programs, financial aid, holds, petitions, registration, and transcripts in one central location in addition to ONE.UF. Access it online at tinyurl.com/uf-onestop.



Gator 1 ID Card

Your Gator 1 ID Card gets you access to free local bus fare, the UF Libraries, prepaid Bookstore, Gator Dining, and Vending accounts, and other campus services. The cost is \$15. Get yours at the the UF Bookstore and Welcome Center (ground floor of Reitz Union, 1900 Museum Road on campus). Bring an official photo ID (driver's license or passport). For more details, go online to go.ufl.edu/gator-1.

Financial Aid Check!

Be sure to check your financial aid information in ONE.UF, which may not include aid from your degree program. You must let the Bursar's Office know of any financial aid awards from your program.

Failure to report all financial aid can result in overpayment to you, and you will not be able to receive aid for future semesters until you have repaid all funds. A hold will be placed on your account to block you from registering for future courses. If the funds are not repaid by deadline, the Bursar's Office will drop your courses.

Bicycling on Campus

Gainesville and the UF campus are quite bicycle-friendly — but riders have to do their part too. Wear a safety helmet and obey traffic laws — including all traffic signs, lights, signals, and the campuswide 20 mile-per-hour speed limit. Bicycling at night? A headlight and reflective tail lights are a must. Failure to do any of these things can result in tickets and fines from the UF Police Department (UFPD). Invest in a good bike lock to prevent theft, and for added security, register your bicycle with UFPD — for details go online to go.ufl.edu/bikereg. Also, download and review UFPD's "Bicycles Are Vehicles" PDF brochure at go.ufl.edu/bikelaws.

Parking on Campus

To park motorized vehicles on campus, you must buy a parking decal from UF Transportation and Parking for a week, month, semester, or year.

Eligibility for campus parking decals is based on whether you live on or off campus and the number of credit hours you have earned to date.

Campus parking restrictions are often lifted outside of 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday — but always check the signs at the lot or garage where you plan to park, to avoid parking fines after hours.

EXPLORING CAMPUS: LANDMARKS AND LOCALES



Grinter Hall

Located at 1532 Union Road across from Peabody and Criser Halls, Grinter Hall is the nerve center of the Graduate School, as well as home to the Office of Research, Center for African Studies, and Center for Latin American Studies.



Peabody and Criser Halls

Across Union Road from Grinter Hall stand Peabody and Criser Halls. Peabody Hall houses the Dean of Students Office, while Criser Hall hosts the Office of Admission, Office of the University Registrar, Bursar's Office, and Office of Student Financial Aid and Scholarships.



Tigert Hall

One block due east of Grinter Hall, where Union Road and S.W. 13th Street meet, Tigert Hall is headquarters for UF's Office of the President, Office of the Provost, Board of Trustees, and related academic affairs units.



Century Tower and University Auditorium

Just west of Grinter Hall, iconic Century Tower and University Auditorium soar above the historic core of the UF campus. Century Tower's carillon chimes frequently throughout the day, while University Auditorium serves as a venue for public speakers and performances.



Plaza of the Americas and the UF Libraries

Facing the Century Tower and University Auditorium complex is the Plaza of the Americas — a lively, well-landscaped “town square” abuzz with student activity — hemmed in part by Libraries East and West (main hub of the UF George A. Smathers Libraries system).



Institute of Black Culture

Founded in 1971, the Institute of Black Culture (across from the UF Libraries at 1510 W. University Avenue) provides an open house environment where Black scholarship, culture, and community at UF are fueled through study, activism, and social events.



Institute of Hispanic-Latino Cultures: La Casita

Established in 1994, the Institute of Hispanic-Latino Cultures (nicknamed “La Casita”) at 1504 W. University Avenue serves as a hearth of connection, fellowship, and activity for Hispanic-Latinx students within the UF campus community.



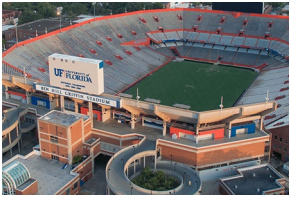
Alachua: “French Fries”

The gigantic, eye-catching bright yellow steel sculpture “Alachua” (jocularly nicknamed “French Fries”) forms a gateway of sorts, leading from campus' historic core, through the Computer Science and Engineering building atrium, towards the Reitz Union.



Reitz: The Union

The J. Wayne Reitz Student Union (686 Museum Road) — colloquially “Reitz” or “The Union” — houses the Student Activities Center, Career Connections Center, Student Government offices, the campus bookstore, a food court, and much, much more.



Ben Hill Griffin Stadium: “The Swamp”

This 88,548-seat arena at 157 Gale Lernerand Drive is home field to the Florida Gators football team and occasional venue for commencement ceremonies and student pep rallies. It is the largest stadium in the state of Florida and twelfth-largest in the United States.



Southwest Recreation Center

The Southwest Recreation Center (3150 Hull Road) features 140,000 square feet of state-of-the-art exercise, recreation, and athletic facilities and programming to keep UF’s student body active, fit, and agile.



Harn Museum of Art

The Harn Museum (3529 Hull Road) boasts 40,000-plus square feet of exhibition space, five gardens, and a 250-seat auditorium where the UF campus community can find cultural enrichment through visual art — including impressive African and Asian collections.



Phillips Center for the Performing Arts

The 1,700-seat Phillips Center (3259 Hull Road) brings world-class entertainment — ranging from Broadway theater to global music-makers to contemporary wits and insightful storytellers — right to the UF campus... with specially priced student tickets, to boot!



Florida Museum of Natural History

The Florida Museum of Natural History (3125 Hull Road) showcases a permanent collection focused on Florida’s flora, fauna, fossils, and historic peoples — along with a butterfly rainforest and traveling exhibits.



UF Student Health Care Center

Located in The Infirmary at 280 Fletcher Drive, the UF Student Health Care Center offers both primary and specialized medical care (including women’s and LGBTQ health), plus pharmacy services and more, to keep UF’s student body healthy.



UF Counseling and Wellness Center

The UF Counseling and Wellness Center (3190 Radio Road) provides one-on-one counseling, group workshops, crisis management services, and special programs to sustain mental health, emotional balance, and social well-being among UF’s student body.

Natural Gem

Gainesville's bevy of lakes, springs, rivers, parks, and trails puts Mother Nature and outdoor recreation within easy reach — from UF's own Lake Wauburg to nearby Paynes Prairie, Kanapaha Botanical Gardens, Santa Fe Teaching Zoo, Ichetucknee Springs, and more.



Cultural Crossroads

Gainesville's museums, theaters, art galleries, and music venues — such as the Hippodrome, the Cade Museum, the Gainesville Community Playhouse, to name but a few — host a lively cultural scene that will energize your interest, imagination, and insight.



Innovation Hub

Gainesville's Innovation District — with UF Innovate within it — is an incubator that hatches economic opportunity and technological advancement by grooming budding entrepreneurs and startup ventures bent on moving research out of labs and into lives.



Sports Fan

Whether you like to cheer from the stands or join in the action, Gainesville offers plenty of avenues for sports and physical fitness — from the athletic powerhouse of the Florida Gators to amateur intramural teams and exercise facilities, both indoors and out.



Night Owl

Even graduate students need a night out on the town now and then — and Gainesville's broad selection of eateries, pubs, nightclubs, movie theaters, and other entertainment options can help you make the most fun of your downtime after hours.



Home Sweet Home

On campus or off, Gainesville features a varied array of housing options — from vintage chic to just-built luxe — that meet virtually any budget, taste, or lifestyle, with convenient access to local shopping, healthcare, and other quality-of-life amenities.



On the Move

Gainesville is a bicycle-friendly town that also treats UF students to free bus fare on its Regional Transit System (RTS) — handy alternatives if you don't dig daily commutes and parking permits. Need to travel by air? Gainesville Regional Airport is here to serve you.

Downtown

Downtown Gainesville, at the intersection of University Avenue and Main Street, is the hub for city and county government by day, scene of good eats and entertainment by night. Check out its array of eateries, nightclubs, music venues, and art galleries — plus the stately Hippodrome Theatre (thehipp.org) for live performances and unique cinema.



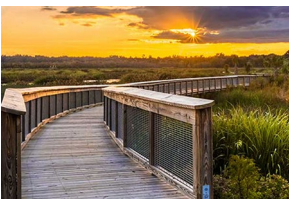
Midtown

Midtown — the neighborhood just north and east of the UF campus along University Avenue and 13th Street — bustles with activity day and night, thanks to nearby student housing, restaurants, shops, and nightlife hot spots. Among its conveniences is a fully-stocked, full-service Publix Super Market just one block from campus.



Shopping Zones: Butler Plaza • Celebration Pointe • Oaks Mall

Butler Plaza (tinyurl.com/butler-pnt) and Celebration Pointe (tinyurl.com/c-pointe) on Archer Road, plus Newberry Road's Oaks Mall (tinyurl.com/oaksmall) offer plenty of shopping options, from big-box retail chains to local merchants — plus fast food, fine dining, movie theaters, and grocery stores galore.



Green Space: Parks and Nature Trails

Get outdoors in Gainesville at its bevy of parks and nature trails (tinyurl.com/parks-gnv), including Boulware Springs, Morningside Living History Farm, Westside Park and Pool, and downtown's Depot Park. Nearby Kanapaha Gardens (kanapaha.org) and Paynes Prairie (tinyurl.com/paynesppsp) offer more chances to commune with local flora and fauna.



Health Care Landmarks

On campus and off, Gainesville hosts a wide variety of medical professionals for your physical and mental well-being. Two local health care landmarks to be aware of right off the bat: UF Health's Shands Hospital at 1600 S.W. Archer Road (tinyurl.com/uf-shands), and North Florida Hospital at 6500 W. Newberry Road (tinyurl.com/gnv-nfh).



Family Circle: Schools • Daycare • Libraries • Youth Activities

Getting Around Town

Both pedestrian and bicycle friendly, Gainesville also offers free bus fare for UF students on its Regional Transit System (go-rts.com). Alongside conventional taxis and car rental agencies, alternatives Lyft, Uber, and Zipcar are available locally — as well as grab-and-go electric scooter rentals Bird, Spin, and Veo.
